

Police Chaplain

The Guilderland Police Department recognizes the support that law enforcement chaplaincy programs provide both to the law enforcement community and to the citizens the police department serves. In this important work, the chaplain can assist personnel as they deal with the pressures and responsibilities of life, and of their professions, as well as respond to victims of crime and tragedy. Duties of the chaplain include confidential counseling of agency personnel and their families in stress management, personal crisis and family life and in providing assistance following line-of-duty serious injury or death, provide assistance in making death notifications and attending suicides or other incidents where a chaplain may be of assistance. Other duties include ministering to any person upon the request of officers, responding to the scene of major incidents, serving as a liaison to area clergy and assisting with ceremonial functions.



From the Chaplain's Desk

It is an honor to serve as the Police Chaplain for the Town of Guilderland Police Department. Having served in the town as a paramedic from 1997-2002, I am aware of the great commitment that it takes to be a first responder. I have known many in the department for nearly 20 years and have a great respect for them all; not only as officers for the tremendous work they do, but for them as people. I have seen them perform courageously, putting themselves in harm's way day in and day out so others would not face harm. I have seen them provide professional and courteous service to the community even when they may have not been accorded that same courtesy. I have also been encouraged by the response that this community has had for the police department and its members. In an era of increasing tensions elsewhere, the Guilderland Police Department has maintained and even strengthened its relationship with the community it serves. This is a testament to the professionalism that all members of the department have, especially and including the incredible work that is done by the dispatchers. I have had the privilege this year to pray at several dedications in which the town bestows the honor of naming roadways for members of our community who have given the ultimate sacrifice in military service to our country. I have enjoyed spending time with officers and the community doing ride-alongs, at National Night Out at the Tawasentha Park and at the Altamont Fair. When shots rang out at Crossgates Mall, I stood amazed at the incredible response of not only our department, but those of surrounding communities. As the afternoon pressed into night, I offered support to the officers with coffee, water, food and prayer. I have been requested by officers to respond to death notifications and help support victims of crime. I have also visited sick and injured officers and offered support to all in the department to help them and their families in any way I can. Thank you for the opportunity to serve my community and my GPD family this year. I pray a blessing of safety, courage, dedication, trust and compassion.

Communications

The Guilderland Police Department Communications Division is staffed with certified Enhanced 911 Telecommunicators. E911 means that when you call 911, the address you are calling from is automatically displayed on the telecommunications screen along with GPS coordinates on the mapping display. This is crucial in the event a person becomes unconscious before giving their location or a crime in progress prevents the caller from giving the address. The Division is a 24 hour operation and is a vital link to the residents and businesses in the Town of Guilderland as well as the emergency personnel in the field.

Each telecommunicator is certified in Emergency Medical Dispatch. EMD is an important process in which the telecommunicator will give pre-arrival instructions to the caller before responding units arrive. This year, two telecommunicators gave such instructions on two separate dates on how to deliver a baby. Both babies were born prior to the responding unit's arrival. Both telecommunicators received stork pins for their outstanding instructions in delivering two healthy babies.



Communications is also responsible for the Mobile Command Post. This vehicle is utilized as an alternate communications center and dispatched to scenes of major incidents. This vehicle responded to 7 Ayre Drive for a fully involved structure fire on January 24, 2016 where family members had to be rescued. Utilizing this vehicle helped isolate communications burdens with this particular call. Two telecommunicators received the Meritorious Service Award for their participation in that call.



This year telecommunicators received over 17,000 911 calls for service. Those 911 calls do not include non-emergency calls or transferred cellular 911 calls. On November 12, 2016, over five-hundred 911 calls were made to the communications center for a report of a shooting at Crossgates Mall. Because the volume was so high, many of these calls rolled over to other area 911 centers. Within the first ten minutes of the incident, our telecommunicators received more than 100 calls.

Patrol Division



The Patrol Division is the largest and most visible component of the Guilderland Police Department; its officers are normally the first to respond to calls for police service. Patrol officers always try to maintain a close relationship with the community and foster a positive police-community relationship.

The Patrol Division is staffed by a First Sergeant and 3 Sergeants, 25 Patrol Officers which includes 1 canine officer. It is overseen by Captain Dan McNally.

The Patrol Division is responsible for the initial investigation of all crime reports, traffic enforcement, and crime prevention activity.

The Guilderland Police Department has two stations. One is located at the Guilderland Town Hall and the other is located lower level at Crossgates Mall.

Patrol vehicles are equipped with modern equipment including multi-channel two-way radios, lap top computers which are called Mobil Data Terminals (MDT's). Officers use the MDT's to complete reports, write traffic citations, do records checks to see if someone is wanted or a persons' license or registration is valid. Officers also carry an Automated External Defibrillator otherwise known as AED, which can be used if someone is in cardiac arrest.

Some of the Patrol Division responsibilities include responding to complaints, motor vehicle crashes, assist a person with a vehicle lock out, check on vacant properties and homes when people are away on vacation, respond to "quality-of-life" issues such as noise complaints, traffic enforcement, neighbor disputes and suicidal subjects. But most of all, proactive policing and being visible to the public are an invaluable part of policing.



Traffic Safety Unit

The Guilderland Police Department is dedicated to keeping our roads safe through the strict enforcement of the Vehicle and Traffic law. In 2016, members of the department conducted 8,791 vehicle stops which resulted in 4,491 issued traffic citations, a slight increase from the previous year. Through active enforcement and dedicated DWI patrols, the Guilderland Police Department made 136 Driving While Intoxicated arrests, 8 Driving While Ability Impaired arrests, and 14 Driving While Ability Impaired by Drugs arrests. The Guilderland Police Department participated in twelve dedicated DWI enforcement patrols which were strategically scheduled by Albany County STOP-DWI. Although Driving While Intoxicated related arrests were down from 2015, it appears proactive enforcement is working, and fewer offenders are driving on the roadways.



The Guilderland Police Department was honored at the annual STOP-DWI breakfast awards ceremony in December. Officer John Laviano, a 3 year member of the Guilderland Police Department, and Officer Todd Roberts, a 5 year member of the Guilderland Police Department, received the Guy Barringer award. This award is given to officers for dedication to highway safety and removing impaired/intoxicated drivers from the roadways. Both officers lead their shifts in DWI related arrests. The Traffic Safety Unit is actively involved in the Albany County Stop



DWI program and continues to host the Stop DWI Victim's Impact Panel eight times per year. The department also participated in Buckle Up New York, Operation Safe Stop Education Enforcement Day, No Empty Chair, and the STEP (Selective Traffic Enforcement Program, which is the enforcement of violations such as, aggressive driving, speeding, and driver distraction which includes the use of cellular phones and electronic devices). The Guilderland Police Department continues to partner with the Guilderland Central School District for Operation Safe Stop.

Accident investigations and reconstructions are also conducted by members of the Traffic Safety Unit. The officers are highly trained in accident reconstruction and utilize a tool called Total Station. This device provides detailed measurements, resulting in exact accident reconstructions and is used in serious personal injury and fatal accidents.



Community Services Unit

The Community Services Unit provides a proactive approach to law enforcement. This is accomplished by working with community groups, neighborhoods, businesses, schools and other members of the public to identify and resolve community problems.

The Community Service Officers educate the public on a multitude of topics such as crime prevention and awareness. The unit's efforts help to foster a stronger working relationship between the department and the community we serve.

Officer Hanzalik and Officer Stallmer, both certified D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) instructors, expanded the Guilderland Police Departments D.A.R.E. instruction to now include all 5th grade elementary students within the Guilderland School District. D.A.R.E. provides the students in our community with the necessary skills and information they need to make good life choices. 2016 was a successful year with over 400 students graduating the D.A.R.E. program.




EXPLORER POST

Guilderland Police Department Explorer Post 0155 has entered its 24th year. It is a division of the Boy Scouts of America open to boys and girls between the ages of 14 and 20. This is a career-orientated program that gives the youth in our community the opportunity to explore a career in law enforcement by working closely with members of the department. The Post meets the 2nd and 4th Tuesday evening of each month. During this time the Explorers receive training in police exercises and conduct other post activities. The Explorers attended a new local High Stress Day event which was held in Albany. This event was put together by all local law enforcement Explorer Posts and their advisors. This training places Police Explorers in high stress situations which they are required to resolve. The training is conducted in a safe educational environment and is meant to be academic as well as fun. The Explorers traveled to The University of Hartford in July 2016, to attend an annual week long academy and received numerous awards in many different aspects of the program. The Explorer Post assisted the police department at several events during the year doing such things as traffic control and providing crime prevention material during displays.

RAD

The Rape Aggression Defense program is a self defense class for women in our community that provides them with realistic self defense tactics and techniques. This program has proven to be successful with 2016 being one of our busiest years. The Community Services Unit partnered with the Guilderland Public Library and the Guilderland Central School District (Continuing Education Program) to offer fall and spring classes. The Guilderland Central School District also allowed this 12 hour program to be provided to female senior students during the class day, with 2 sessions being conducted in 2016.






State of New York Police Juvenile Officers Association

Officers Stallmer and Hanzalik attended the the SNYPJOA annual conference and became DCJS certified Juvenile Officers. This class is a 5-day DCJS-certified course which was developed for the juvenile law enforcement officer to assist them in their daily duties with the laws and procedures related to juveniles. It offers them insight into juvenile diversion programs, investigative techniques, interview and interrogation skills along with information on substance abuse, missing persons and current trends in juvenile related crimes.

The National Incident Management System (NIMS) was created after the 9/11 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center and Pentagon. NIMS is a systematic, proactive approach to guide departments and agencies at all levels of government, non-governmental organizations, and the private sector to work together seamlessly and manage incidents involving all threats and hazards—regardless of cause, size, location, or complexity—in order to reduce loss of life, property and harm to the environment. Officer Ingle has worked closely with the Guilderland Central School District to establish a district wide Incident Command structure and promote the use of NIMS during school emergencies. The changes in this area have been significant and the response to emergency incidents has improved dramatically.



FBI Child Abduction Training


In May 2016 Officers Ingle and Stallmer attended a 4 day intensive training exercise conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This training is to help local law enforcement prepare for responding to child abduction and missing children in our community. Instruction was provided by members of the FBI's Child Abduction Rapid Deployment Team (CARD) and profilers from the FBI's Behavioral Analysis Unit. The course topics included: overview of child sexual offenders, understanding child abductors, phases of the investigation response, investigative tools and resources, and abduction case studies. The training then culminated with a full day child abduction field exercise.



The Community Services Unit began Coffee with a Cop in 2016. The events bring police officers and the community members they serve together -over coffee- to discuss issues and learn more about each other. It takes place at local coffee establishments and residents can sit down with officers and ask questions or share what's on their mind. Coffee with a Cop is a national program with events hosted in all 50 states.

DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

The Community Services Unit in conjunction with the Guilderland Public Library participated in 2 Drug Take Back Days in 2016. The National Prescription Drug Take Back Day aims to provide a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of prescription drugs, while also educating the general public about the potential for abuse and medications. The Guilderland Police collected over 1500 lbs of expired or unused prescriptions drugs during these events.



The Guilderland Police Community Services Unit was honored to take part in a local fundraiser for the Special Olympics of New York athletes. Dunkin' Donuts paired up with local law enforcement to sponsor the event. Several members of the department came out to support the vital efforts and programs of the Special Olympics New York to enhance the lives of both children and adults with developmental disabilities.




The Community Services Unit hosted several other events during the year including child car safety inspections and installations, Project CHILDSAFE (distribution of free gun locks), Neighborhood Watch presentations, National Night Out at Tawasentha Park, Take Me Home Program and presented a Halloween safety puppet show at Trick or Treat Street.



Criminal Investigation Unit

The Criminal Investigation Unit handles a wide variety of cases within the Police Department. Members of the CIU carry a case load, work on assigned tasks and assist the Patrol Unit when needed. The CIU has 2 investigators who are supervised by a Senior Investigator. This unit primarily handles felony cases and each investigator is forensically trained to process crime scenes. Some of the CIU's other functions are evidence and property room, accident investigation, warrants, photo arrays, pistol permits, employee background checks, peddler's permit backgrounds, professional standard investigations, drug investigations, death investigations and criminal investigations.

Criminals tend to cross town boundaries making it necessary for the CIU to work closely with area agencies (local, state and federal) to have successful conclusions to cases. Some of



these agencies include; United States Secret Service, DEA, FBI, Homeland Security, Capital District Narcotics Enforcement Task Force, New York State Police, New York State Narcotics Enforcement, Albany County Sheriffs, Probation/Parole, Albany Crime Analysis Center and other area police agencies. In addition, the CIU works emergency scenes with the town fire departments, ambulance services and paramedics. In November, the Guilderland Police Department received reports of shots fired in Crossgates Mall by the Apple Store. The Guilderland Police, along with several area police agencies, initially responded to Crossgates as an active shooter protocol. The mall perimeter was secured as police agencies searched for the shooter. The mall was searched store by

store until everyone had been evacuated. The area of the shooting was processed by members of the Guilderland Police Department and New York State Police. Evidence was collected and security video was reviewed supporting the reports that shots were fired in the common area of the mall. The shooter was identified with the assistance of the Albany Crime Analysis Center and other members of law enforcement. Two days after the shooting, the shooter, who had been identified as Tasheem Maeweather of Albany, was taken into custody with the assistance of the Albany Police Department. Mr. Maeweather went to trial and was convicted on one count of his 4 count indictment. Mr. Maeweather received an additional 2 ½ year sentence added on to his time for a probation violation.

ONGOING INVESTIGATION:

The CIU would like to remind everyone that the 2015 homicide of the Guilderland family on Western Ave. is still open. Anyone that has any information that may help solve this case is asked to call the CIU or the New York State Police.

January



- The Guilderland Police department was contacted by parents of a female juvenile who was having inappropriate contact with a 40 year old employee of Rollarama in Rotterdam. Evidence was secured through a search warrant. Additional search warrants were obtained for the search of the suspect's residence and vehicle. Members of the Guilderland Police Department, New York State Police Computer Crimes Unit and the FBI executed the warrant at the suspect's residence in the City of Schenectady. Mark Hoatling was taken into custody, interviewed, arrested and remanded to the Albany County Correctional facility. Mr. Hoatling's case was transferred to the Albany County District Attorney where he later pled to 6 months in jail with 5 years probation.

February

- The CIU investigated the sale of narcotics from a residence on Western Ave. Members of the Guilderland Police Department used a confidential informant to purchase prescription narcotics from the suspect's residence in Guilderland. Members of the department conducted a controlled buy and the suspect was taken into custody and identified as Patrick Horaczek. Mr. Horaczek was interviewed, arrested and remanded to the Albany County Correctional Facility. Mr. Horaczek pled guilty and was sentenced to time served and had to forfeit cash earned by his illegal narcotic sales.

March

- The CIU assisted the Patrol Division with a burglary in progress on Ostrander Rd. A vehicle description was secured and patrols located the vehicle on Route 146. The vehicle was stopped, the suspect was interviewed and investigators responded to the residence that was burglarized. Evidence was collected from the crime scene and the suspect was transported to the station. Jeffrey Cascini was arrested for DWI, Burglary and Criminal Mischief and remanded to the Albany County Correctional Facility. Mr. Cascini's case has been transferred to the Albany County Court for adjudication.




April

- The CIU assisted the Patrol Division with a fatal motor vehicle accident at the Citizens Bank located at Schoolhouse Rd. and Western Ave. The vehicle, driven by Cory Ash of Albany, was traveling at a high rate of speed, failed to negotiate the curve at the on ramp to the Northway from Western Ave. and rolled several times coming to rest near the ATM at Citizens Bank. The engine separated from the vehicle and went through the



corner of the bank near the drive-thru lanes. Mr. Ash was taken to Albany Medical Center where he was pronounced dead a short time later. There was major damage to the bank, the roadway and the vehicle was destroyed. The vehicle had been stolen from a business in Albany where it had been left running.



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- The CIU investigated a burglary from an occupied apartment located in Regency Park Apartments. A woman reports while she was sleeping, someone entered her apartment through a second story balcony window and stole items from various locations inside the apartment. A Play Station game was stolen during this burglary which led to the development of a suspect. The investigation revealed the suspect had committed similar burglaries in several jurisdictions. Talib Barnes was interviewed and confessed to the burglary. Mr. Barnes pled guilty to all burglaries and was sentenced to state prison.

May

- The Guilderland Police department received a 911 call stating a man had been pulled into a wood chipper while working in a development off Carman Rd. The CIU responded to the scene and investigated this incident. The owner of a local tree company reports while working with a crane to take down large trees at a residence, one of his employees had somehow been pulled into the wood chipper. The employee, Justice Booze, was pronounced dead at the scene. The Guilderland Police Department was assisted by Guilderland EMS, Guilderland Town Highway Employees and OSHA.

June

- The Guilderland Police department received a call for a bicyclist who had been struck by a vehicle on Main St. in the Village of Altamont. Patrols responded and determined that the bicyclist and his girlfriend had been involved in a dispute at a residence, the bicyclist left on his bicycle and the girlfriend followed in a vehicle. The girlfriend then intentionally drove over the curb onto the sidewalk intentionally striking the bicyclist. The girlfriend fled the scene leaving the boyfriend in the roadway and dragging the bicycle under the vehicle for over a mile. The CIU was called to assist with documenting the scene, photographs, and evidence collection. The vehicle was located at the residence. The girlfriend was located and arrested. The girlfriend has since taken a plea in court.

July

- The CIU investigated a “distraction burglary” where 2 suspects talked their way into the residence of an elderly female and asked to use the bathroom. While the female



suspect went to the bathroom the male suspect distracted the homeowner. The female suspect stole several pieces of jewelry from a back bedroom. Angelina Bovia and Carlos Hernandez were arrested while leaving the residence. Steven Allen was arrested in the getaway vehicle which had been parked in a

driveway. Through investigation it was learned the three suspects also burglarized a house in the Town of Rotterdam. Both suspects pled guilty to the burglaries in the Town of Rotterdam and the Town of Guilderland. Miss Bovia received a sentence of 8 years in state prison. Carlos Hernandez failed to show for sentencing and was later captured on a warrant issued for his arrest. Mr. Hernandez was sentenced to state prison. Steven Allen was given time served. Proceeds of the burglary were recovered at the scene and have since been returned to the homeowner.

- The CIU investigated a burglary at the Apple Store in Crossgates Mall where the suspect



pushed open a front glass door. The suspect, while inside, stole 2 iPads and then left the store. Management was able to secure video footage of the suspect and Investigators were able to lift a fingerprint from the entry front door glass. The fingerprint was sent to the Department of Criminal Justice Service Latent Print Unit and identified as

belonging to Yehezkel Harvey. Video footage confirmed Mr. Harvey matched the suspect committing the burglary. Mr. Harvey had multiple cases pending in Albany Police Court and was located in the Albany County Correctional Facility. Mr. Harvey was indicted, pled guilty and was sentenced to State Prison on all cases.

September

- The CIU responded to 2020 Western Ave. to assist a New York State Education Investigator on a complaint of practicing massage without a license. When investigators arrived, 2 juveniles were at the business while employees were giving massages to customers. The individuals involved were arrested and the location has since been closed and is out of business.

October

- The CIU investigated a burglary to a residence on Ostrander Rd. where entry was made by smashing out a rear window with a rock from the yard. The homeowner reports that two additional homes owned by their family were burglarized in different jurisdictions



and in 2 of the burglaries firearms were taken. The Ostrander Rd. scene was processed for evidence and a list of suspects was developed of which a former family member was prime. Sean Bouck was the former husband of one of the family members, knew the locations of the 3 family homes and was familiar

with the pets inside the residences. Mr. Bouck was living with Nicole Mason and her boyfriend Victor Mattson in Glenville. Miss Mason was picked up on a criminal case in Glenville and interviewed by the New York State Police and Glenville Detectives. Miss Mason admitted to the burglaries and identified the participants from all of the burglaries. Miss Mason and Mr. Bouck were arrested for the Ostrander Rd. burglary. Victor Mattson was a New York State Parole violator, on the run, and was arrested at a later date. The defendants pled guilty to the three burglaries and all received state prison time. Miss Mason received a sentence of 5 years, Mr. Bouck received a sentence of 8 years and Mr. Mattson received a sentence of 3 years. Some of the weapons were recovered in these cases and return to their owner.

November

- The CIU was called to assist the patrol division with a stabbing at a house party in Regency Park Apartments.



Friends had gathered to celebrate Thanksgiving when an argument broke out between 2 males in the apartment. This argument turned physical and resulted in one of the males

being stabbed in the chest. The suspect was still at the scene when patrols arrived and he was detained. Witness statements were secured, evidence was collected and the knife used was located. The suspect was interviewed at the station, arrested and his case was pled out in Albany County Court.





December

- The CIU investigated the attempted cashing of 2 stolen checks at NBT Bank in Guilderland. The woman attempted to cash the checks with false identification and the



teller contacted police while she was processing the check. Patrols responded, the woman fled the scene in her vehicle and refused to stop for marked patrol vehicles. The vehicle was later recovered in the west end of town and secured and impounded. A warrant to search the vehicle was obtained. The vehicle was processed for

fingerprints, DNA and physical evidence. Fingerprints secured from the vehicle were sent to the Division of Criminal Justice Service and were identified as belonging to Kimberly Maines. Investigators reviewed video surveillance from NBT Bank which matched Miss Maines and a DNA hit from the vehicle confirmed this. Miss Maines was found to be incarcerated in the State of Connecticut. The case was transferred to the Albany County Court where Miss Maines was indicted and now is awaiting extradition.



Guilderland Emergency Medical Services



In 2016, the Town of Guilderland Paramedic Division continued to provide the finest advanced emergency care in the area. In addition to responding in the Town of Guilderland, paramedics are the primary advanced life support responders to the Town of Knox, a portion of the SUNY Albany Campus, and the NYS Thruway. Over the course of the year, we responded to 6,227 emergency calls. Thousands of town residents and visitors were treated for emergencies ranging from bleeding and shock to alleviating pain and suffering. Every patient requiring emergency medical services in the Town of Guilderland was evaluated by a town paramedic. After the initial assessment, the patient requiring advanced life support was transported in a local ambulance under the care of the town paramedic. If advanced life support was not required, the patient would be turned over to one of the basic life support ambulances for transport to a local hospital. The paramedic would then go back in service to cover the town and prepare for the next response.

The Division

Staff – The Paramedic Division is comprised of 21 paramedics including Senior Paramedic Supervisor Jay Tyler and 5 field Supervisors. Police Captain Daniel McNally provides general oversight and direction to the entire unit. Of the 21 paramedics, 16 are full time and 5 are part time. The paramedic unit is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week; provides training and support to the local fire, police and community organizations. Guilderland EMS is an American Heart Association Training Center and is very active in community outreach.

Medical Control – The paramedic unit provides advanced life support under the medical direction of Dr. Donald Doynow. Dr. Doynow is an emergency room physician at St. Peters Hospital in Albany and Bassett Hospital in Cooperstown. In addition, he is the medical director for both Hudson Valley Community College and SUNY Cobleskill’s paramedic programs. He is chairman of the State Emergency Medical Advisory Committee (SEMAC), as well as a member of the Regional Emergency Medical Organization which provides medical oversight for a six county area in New York State. He is a vital part of the system and his guidance has ensured the success of the unit.

Vehicles- Sport Utility Vehicles (ranging in year from 2007 to 2017) are used by paramedics and the medical director to respond to emergency calls.



Initial Care- The Town of Guilderland Communications Division answers all 911 calls received for the town and dispatches the emergency medical calls for the Paramedic Division. The paramedic may receive a dispatch for a non-emergency call in the town to assist the police department in drawing blood samples on subjects with possible substance abuse. A non-emergency call may consist of a welfare check on a senior resident living in the community or a request for a paramedic to standby for a fire department call. In addition, several large events held in the town are provided paramedics to remain onsite and provide advanced medical care.



American Heart Association

American Heart Association Training Center 2016

In 2016, the Guilderland EMS American Heart Association Training Center provided training to the community and the Emergency Services Staff of the Town of Guilderland. The Training Center organized and trained a total of 575 students in the various disciplines (Healthcare Provider CPR, Heart Saver CPR and Heart Saver CPR with First Aid).

In March of 2016, Guilderland EMS participated in the “Journey Through the Body” event held by St. Peters Hospital at Crossgates Mall. This two day event was free to the public and provided educational exhibits and life sized models of the body systems. Guilderland EMS was invited to provide CPR instruction to children and parents. The paramedics reviewed the importance of recognizing an emergency, contacting 911 and performing “Hands Only CPR”. Children and parents from all over the capital region participated in this event and it was met with great success.

In the summer of 2016, the training center participated in “National Night Out” sponsored by the Guilderland Police Department. The event enabled the Training Center to continue with the “Hands Only CPR” initiative. During the event, “Hands Only CPR” was demonstrated and the importance of activating 911 was stressed. In addition, it enabled the Training Center to review signs and symptoms of a stroke. This event resulted in the training of an additional 75 people in “Hands Only CPR” and brought stroke awareness to the public.

The “Hands Only CPR” program continues to advance throughout the region. Guilderland EMS held several events on the SUNY campus, local fire departments and the YMCA. This program provides valuable training to the citizens of our community and increases the chance of survival for individuals in cardiac arrest.

Paramedic Training

In an effort to continue the education of our paramedic staff and provide excellent care, the EMS Department has implemented a training program comprised of nationally recognized courses. In the fall of 2016, Guilderland EMS hosted a NAEMT Pre-Hospital Trauma Life Support Course. This course provides valuable training in the treatment of patients exposed to trauma. Participants in the course attended a 2 day, 16 hour lecture series and skills evaluation. Members of the department were certified by the National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians.

Guilderland EMS has two NYS Certified Instructor Coordinators at the paramedic level on staff; which allows the town to be able to provide all the required national, state, and regional continuing medical education requirements for the entire unit. This training allows the town to be able to voucher New York State \$500 per paramedic upon renewal of their certification. The Paramedics continue their education throughout the year (minimum 24 hours per paramedic) to maintain their skills and increase their medical knowledge.



Accomplishments

Captain Daniel McNally and Senior Paramedic Supervisor Jay Tyler had the honor representing GEMS at the annual Stop DWI Award Recognition Ceremony. Guilderland Emergency Medical Services was selected and awarded the “Michele E. Martin Memorial Award” for its assistance to law enforcement with incidents surrounding DWI.

Paramedic Action Team- In 2014 EMS agencies throughout NYS received an order from the Commissioner of NYS Department of Health to be prepared for Ebola and other Class A Infectious Diseases, should a response be needed. In 2016 this program continues. Guilderland EMS has six paramedics assigned to this team, with experience in these types of responses while members of either the military or fire department. The paramedics are certified in either Hazardous Waste Operations and Response (HAZWOPER) or Hazardous Waste and Materials (HAZMAT). Training is conducted in order to remain proficient in the response, donning and doffing of gear.

Active Shooter Training – In the Spring of 2015, Captain McNally and two paramedics from the department obtained instructor certification as instructors in Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALERRT); Active Shooter II Program. This program provides training for law enforcement and EMS providers. The course includes active shooter mass casualty scenarios, identifying the threat, treatment of wounded, establishment of casualty collection points, rapid triage and integrated responses with police/EMS/fire personnel. In 2016 instruction continued; the town instructors participated in the



training law enforcement and EMS personnel in Albany, Schenectady, and Saratoga counties.

Equipment Upgrades- In an effort to improve electronic patient care charting, Guilderland EMS purchased iPads for the paramedic operation, and upgraded the EMSCharting software. This upgrade includes EKG/Data import which allows data to be transmitted directly from monitors to the electronic chart. This allows paramedics to document patient care reports while positioned in a system status mode or returning from hospitals. This also mitigates overtime by reducing necessary documentation after shift.



2016 Community Outreach Program

In 2016, the Guilderland Community Outreach program continued to provide educational events for the residents in the community. The goal of the Community Outreach Program is to educate the public about the emergency services provided in the town and to teach school aged children the importance of 911. Over the course of the year, the Outreach Program has attended the Town of Guilderland National Night Out, Tawasentha Park Summer Camp and the YMCA Healthy Kids Day. The paramedics provide valuable information on health and stroke and heart disease awareness. In addition, coloring books and games are provided to school aged children to encourage the recognition of an emergency and 911 activation. In addition, useful information is provided to parents and the public on the emergency services provided by the town. This has always been a valuable program in promoting the Emergency Services Unit as well as providing valuable information on public health concerns (flu vaccines, stroke awareness, Hands Only CPR, pool safety, helmet use, etc.).



In addition to public events, the community outreach program attends the annual Pine Bush Little League Coaches meeting. This meeting allows for the coaches and parents to learn about the location and use of Public Access Defibrillation and the importance of contacting 911 with the proper information needed in an emergency.

Animal Control/Animal Shelter

The Richard Murray - Town of Guilderland Animal Shelter is located at 6363 Frenches Mill Road in Guilderland Center. The animal control staff, which includes two full time animal control officers and a part time kennel aid, works out of the shelter. They are responsible for the shelter, giving the animals the best care, finding the owners of lost dogs and finding good homes for the ones left behind. The shelter hours are Tuesday thru Thursday 9am to 4 pm by appointment only and Saturdays 12 noon to 5 pm for walk-ins. The public may visit our Facebook page, call us at 518-861-6855 or just stop in on

Saturdays to say hello and see what dogs we might have available.



The Animal Control Officers are also responsible for public safety and enforcing relevant sections of town law as well as NYS Agriculture and Markets law article 7; picking up stray dogs around town, and dealing with basic wildlife issues.

NIXLE

The Guilderland Police Department has enhanced our use of NIXLE in conjunction with a town wide roll out making it available to all town departments. The police department had been using the system since 2014 but it was limited in its use. Alerts will automatically post to our Twitter and Facebook page giving us the ability to reach more people.

Alerts are used for any sudden event that impacts travel throughout the town or an event where there is a risk to public safety. Some examples of these alerts include (but not limited to) relaying information on emergency extended road or lane closures, advising and seeking assistance to locate a missing person and alerts of police activity in a specific area to advise the public to stay out of the area. We will also be using NIXLE to send important non-emergency information such as press releases and information on community events the department hosts or participates in.

Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events Training (CRASE)

The CRASE course was developed by Advanced Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALERRT)[™] at Texas State University. The course was developed to provide strategies to individuals, to help protect themselves and reduce the dangers faced during an active shooter event. It is designed and built on the Avoid/Deny/Defend strategy, which has been developed as an easy to remember method for individuals to follow. Several classes have been held for the public as well as many specialized locations such as offices and businesses with over 600 individuals trained. It is important to note that one such training was held at the Crossgates Mall only a short time before the November shooting incident. The incident occurred only a few feet away from individuals that had attended that training. In feedback after the incident, these individuals said that they applied what they had learned and knew exactly what to do.





Furthermore, I would like to acknowledge the members of Brownie Troop 1192 for their patriotism and precise folding of our American Flag:



Section 9 - Juvenile Dispositions

Reported Dispositions of Juvenile Arrests (Under 16)

This page presents annual disposition counts for those juvenile arrests reported by your agency to DCJS through the Federal Crime Reporting Program. A juvenile arrest is defined by the Federal Crime Reporting Program as any law enforcement contact with a juvenile for a crime that would have resulted in an arrest if the juvenile were an adult. Due to the differences in how juvenile and adult arrests are handled, the UCR program collects data on juvenile arrest dispositions to capture the initial referral that occurs after a juvenile is taken into custody for committing an offense.

Handled Within Department – Includes instances where police take a juvenile into custody or arrest them for committing a crime but make no referral to juvenile court and do not file formal charges. The juvenile is most likely released to parents or other relatives.

Referred to Juvenile Court or Probation Department – Includes instances where a juvenile is arrested and referred to the probation department or other agency working within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

Referred to Community-Based Organization – Includes instances where a juvenile is referred to a community-based organization, either public or private, rather than to juvenile court or the probation department and no formal charges are filed.

Referred to other Police Agency – Includes instances where a juvenile is arrested by a department at the request of another law enforcement agency, as well as instances where a juvenile who committed crimes in one jurisdiction but resides in another, and is turned over for handling in their home jurisdiction.

Referred to Adult Criminal Court – Instances where a juvenile is formally charged and sent to criminal or adult court.
